

A Note from the Pastor

The Desert in Bloom: Living, Dying and Rising in a Wilderness Church

I have just returned from the NEXT Church National Gathering in Baltimore and once again, I am reminded how thankful I am to you, the congregation, for giving me the opportunity to attend gatherings like this. It was phenomenal -- from worship and keynotes to workshops and conversations with colleagues and friends, old and new.

My time there helped affirm and encourage my Lenten discipline of reaching out to people with whom I disagree, especially about what it means to be church in 21st century Cumberland. It also strengthened my conviction that developing and nurturing community among ourselves is good first step, but we can't stop there.

If we are to take seriously what it means to follow Jesus, we have to continually remind ourselves that we are not just called together but also commissioned and sent out into the world. God sends us out to continue Jesus' ministry, sharing the good news, especially with people in our community who have been hurt by the church or, as in the case of people struggling with addiction, those who are literally dying to hear it.

- We are called to practice the radical hospitality of Jesus, not just with able-bodied cisgendered straight white adults, but with those who are often relegated to the margins.
- We are called to educate ourselves about our often unrecognized privilege and to acknowledge how our participation in long-term systemic racism has impacted people of color; and
- We are called to recognize that not speaking to the important issues in our community is itself a form of speech, just as not acting is a form of action.

Don't get me wrong. We are already doing some of these things and it is producing fruit, good fruit. But sometimes we get derailed in assessing our "success" by focusing only on how many people are sitting in the pews and how much money we have in the bank.

Maybe it's not a bad thing the church is dying, if it is dying to its old ways in order to make way for new life, resurrected life.

To help us claim our resurrection life, NEXT Church has developed a helpful assessment tool that shifts our thinking, represented partly by these statements:

- Think less in terms of church growth and more in terms of kingdom growth.
- Sometimes our work needs to be reduced in order to expand. Sometimes aspects of it need to come to an end.

FEBRUARY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of First Presbyterian Church met in the church library at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 15, 2018 for its stated monthly meeting. The Rev. Caroline M. Kelly served as Moderator. Carolyn Mathews served as temporary Clerk of Session in Jeff Getty's absence.

The Session took the following actions:

- Approved the recommendation of the Worship and Music Committee to receive Josh Gilhart as an active member pending his public profession of faith and baptism during worship on March 4, 2018 (Josh was not been baptized when he "joined" the church in 2017).
- Approved the call of a Congregational meeting on March 4, 2018 to act on the nomination of Josh Gilhart to the 2021 Class of Session (One must be an active member to qualify to serve on the Session).
- Amended the Membership Records as of year-end 2017 and as of January 17, 2018 to correct Josh Gilhart's membership status.
- Confirmed the electronic vote authorizing the solicitation of funds from the Congregation as a gift to retiring Sexton John Brown.
- Approved the recommendation of the Worship and Music Committee to baptize Jax Kennedy Boor, son of Jackie and Chelsea Boor, during worship on March 18, 2018.
- Approved the serving of in-home communion to Polly Eyler by ruling elders Carl and Jane Belt on Sunday, February 4, 2018, *nunc pro tunc*.
- Approved the purchase of fifteen (15) light weight folding tables at a total cost of \$2,400.00 for use in the Fellowship Hall, contingent on the Administration and Finance Committee recommendation about the funding source.
- Approved the Personnel Committee's nomination of Jane Belt, Bob Courtney, Nadene Stroup and Rev. Kelly (*ex officio*) to serve as a search committee for our next Sexton.

In addition the Session heard reports from:

- Brittany Jackson on the extension of wireless service to areas of the church which were dead zones or had weak access.
- Rev. Kelly on her attendance at the NEXT Church Conference on February 26 28, 2018 in Baltimore.
- Agnes Yount on the progress in closing the sale of the Southminster Church property and a forthcoming recommendation concerning the retention of Tara Kellermeyer, Esq. to process the closing.
- David Stickler on his attendance at the Baltimore Presbytery Gathering on February 8, 2018 which began with a thoughtful worship service and continued with a lengthy examination for a commissioned ruling elder.

WHAT'S DESIGNATED

Designated funds are gifts or receipts for a particular purpose, to be spent in the current year or in future years.

For instance, the Reason for the Season gifts in December are being distributed to the recipients, and the Dakota Soup Sale receipts in January have increased the funds

available to support this year's Learning Camp.

Going into March, our largest designated funds, with \$1,000 or more in value, are, in order from largest down:

Special Ministries, Designated Property Improvements, Summer Lunchbox, Dakota Learning Camp, Non-Wills and Memorials Gifts (defined by revenue source, not use), Music - Special Offerings, Southminster Designated Property Improvements (see Note below), Mission - Special Projects, and Employee Emergency Fund.

Note: Approved by Session: After completion of the Southminster church property sale, the sale proceeds will be combined with the \$3,579.71 from the manse sale now in the Southminster Designated Property Improvements account, with the funds to be held pending Session decision on use of the funds for local mission.



Reason for the Season Thanks and Update

Many thanks to all of you who responded to God's gift list for members of God's family you've never met! Your prayerful donations to Reason for the Season will help make 2018 a better year for them!

What did you give? Donations continued to come in through February. The final total was \$9,005.

That's impressive, but what you *really* gave was:

...more resources for "Hope Against Heroin"(\$700), and CityReach Church's "Hope Homes"(\$760), to help people here in Cumberland who are confronting heroin and its horrors, before it's too late. Ask how you can be personally involved, also.

...the ability for volunteers from this area to return to Marty, South Dakota this July, as they promised the Dakota children they would, and to have wonderful resources as they share the joy to learn(\$1120). Is this the year you volunteer to join them?

...scholarships (\$1695) for Christian girls to continue receiving a quality education to learn at Kinnard Academy in Lahore, Pakistan. Their thank-you letters for previous help are on the bulletin board in the hall. Be sure to take a look!

...hammers, helping hands, and hope through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for those who saw way too much water from hurricanes last year (\$1065).

...the sooner reality of a well-drilling machine, and the water it will provide for the thirsty Maasai and their cattle in southern Kenya with much too little water (\$1330).

You also gave to Special Ministries (\$300), the Western MD Food Bank (\$325), and the Interfaith Food Pantry (\$250), all here in Cumberland, to "This Child Here" in Ukraine (\$960), and to the children of Q Mountain orphanage in Lesotho (\$500). Together, a total of \$2335.

A big thank you to all who gave to Reason for the Season, letting God work through you! No total is *too little*, or *too much* for God

Opportunities to Serve

UNION RESCUE MISSION

The Mission Committee is planning to highlight a local or world mission that FPC supports in the monthly church newsletters. This month's local mission to be shared is the Union Rescue Mission of Western MD located in Cumberland. Rev. Dan Taylor's family of two generations founded and successfully ran URM for decades, serving and helping thousands of needy persons and families. Upon their retirement, David Ziler, an ordained pastor, was hired to be the executive director for URM. David's wife, Andrea, is also very involved in their ministry to the Cumberland area.

There are some amazing figures that highlight URM's commitment to our area. They serve 160-200 meals daily. They provide homeless shelter in separate units for women, men, families, and people with disabilities. At full capacity, which is often during the cold months of winter, they can house 62 individuals. Pretty impressive!

Recently, URM has initiated a new health related service for their clients and neighbors, as they have established a walk in health clinic. Davis Ziler's wife, Andrea, is a nurse is overseeing this valuable service. Every Wednesday, a free walk in clinic is open and available to needy people with limited healthcare options. WMHS is an important partner in this service as they provide some staff and supplies. Andrea is available on the other 6 days to monitor support of existing patients through the week if needed. Examples would include monitoring blood pressure and blood sugar levels, making sure patients are complying with medications, and serving as a crisis counselor.
