EPHESIANS 4:17-32

²⁵ So then, putting away falsehood, let all of us speak the truth to our neighbors, for we are members of one another. ²⁶ Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, ²⁷ and do not make room for the devil. ²⁸ Thieves must give up stealing; rather let them labor and work honestly with their own hands, so as to have something to share with the needy. ²⁹ Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, ^[a] as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear. ³⁰ And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were marked with a seal for the day of redemption. ³¹ Put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice, ³² and be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you. ^[b]

ROMANS 12:1-18

12 I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, [a] by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual [b] worship. ² Do not be conformed to this world, [c] but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. [d] ³ For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. ⁴ For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, ⁵ so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. ⁶ We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ⁷ ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; ⁸ the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.

Worship & Notes

The Lord's Table is layered for World Communion Sunday with fabrics from our global travels. The breads represent the different shapes, sizes, and colors of God's people. Today we celebrate communion in spirit with Christians around the world. Thank you to all who contributed to the symbolic beauty of the table.

This 1989 version of the **Lord's Prayer** comes from the New Zealand Prayer Book and reflects the rich earth-based spirituality of the Maori and Polynesian cultures.

Today we welcome back our former Interim Pastor, Dr. Robert Gamble, to worship with us. Rev. Gamble is the director of This Child Here, (www.thischildhere.org), a validated ministry in the Presbyterian Church (USA).

This Child Here trains foster families in Ukraine who take children from orphanages; runs group therapy sessions for the children of soldiers; visits and supports single parent families of the rural poor; and teaches teens and adults Peacemaking skills with the methodology of The Alternatives to Violence Project.

Robert is free after worship to chat in the fellowship hall or to go to lunch.

The music for this World Communion Sunday brings together a real mix of musical styles from different ages and countries. In addition to the various countries, the texts associated with these pieces all emphasize the worldwide fellowship of believers.

The Prelude and Introit are taken from a British early 15th Century folk song, "Deo Gratias" (also called the Agincourt Song). The original text recounts the Battle of Agincourt, in which the English army led by Henry V of England defeated Charles VI of France. The present text ("O Love, How Deep) is a reduction of a 23-stanza Latin text and was translated by Benjamin Webb is 1854. The tune is very bold. Sing heartily!

The Anthem is a 1994 work of Paul Halley, a Grammy Award-winning Canadian composer, choral conductor and organist. Currently, he is the Director of Music of The University of King's College Chapel Choir and of the Cathedral Church of

All Saints in Halifax, Nova Scotia. He was for many years Organist at The Cathedral Church of St, John the Divine in NYC and a part of the Paul Winter Consort. This solo was dedicated to Coretta Scott King, and was sung in her honor on the occasion of her preaching at the Cathedral in New York. The text, by John Greenleaf Whittier, embodies Mrs. King's steadfast vision and hope for mankind:" The dark night is ending and dawn has begun."

"Eat This Bread" is a meditative Communion chant from the International community of Taize, physically located in France. Marc-Antoine Charpentier was a French Baroque composer during the reign of Louis XIV. The Postlude is an organ arrangement of his most famous work, the main theme from his "Te Deum," and is still used today as a fanfare during television broadcasts.
