A Note from the Pastor

Sometimes the old things help us see the things in front of us.

As some of you know; my husband, Mitch, and I went on a very delayed pandemic cruise in the middle of July. We flew to Rome and boarded a ship that went from port to port each day landing us in Italy, France, and Spain. Each day we would wake up in a new location and lace up our tennis shoes to go explore the towns along the Mediterranean coast (and some islands, too!).

Our first stop was Naples, which

happened to be very close to Pompeii. We couldn't help but find our way by bus to the town that was destroyed by the eruption of a nearby 'mountain' (they then knew it was actually a volcano). Mitch and I walked the streets with our excellent guide who showed us a fraction of the 44 out of the 66 acres that have been excavated so far since the eruption in 79 AD.

As we walked the ancient streets and heard stories of life in that place, I was astonished by the advances in technology that they had developed. It was clear that the city was built with a great plan and design which helped it to function in its own way. Sometimes the old ways bring us



back and slow us down - that's what I kept thinking as we walked from street to street and discovered more and more of the city. Take time to notice the good things that came before, and you will be delighted to see something you might have missed.

That is part of the reason I'm so glad we get to sing some "old chestnuts" this summer as we share some of the favorite hymns of members of this congregation. It was fun to see all the responses come in and now to place them within various worship services. As a musician, I am always a fan of adding to worship through music - and some of these hymns are not sung much anymore.



Learning More About The Psalm with Rev. Dr. Jerome Creach



On July 30th and 31st First Presbyterian Church welcomed Rev. Dr. Jerome Creach, professor at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, to help us explore the Psalms and Violence in Scripture.

Saturday evening we dove deep into common (Psalm 23) and unfamiliar (Psalm 137) psalms to explore how they help us understand our relationship and conversation with God. Dr. Creach translated and guided us through the meaning of how the psalms were used and how they continue to help us explore our faith.



On Sunday morning Dr. Creach preached in worship and expanded on Psalm 49, encouraging us to think about our life being "from God and to God" instead of simply striving to achieve in earthly ways. It was a great weekend all around!

Organ Campaign Update

On Friday July 22nd a new 7.5 HP 3 phase electric motor was installed on our rotary bellows fan. This replaced the 1929 5 HP single phase motor that failed on Saturday June 4th. Several weeks were spent investigation having the 1929 motor rebuilt but it was finally determined that a new 3 phase motor was much less expensive. Maryland Electric extended a 3 phase electrical service line to the Bellows Fan Room, and we were ready for installation of the new motor. At worship service Sunday, July 24th Judie Brown played the Postlude on our organ to the surprise and standing ovation of all in attendance.

All materials and equipment for the new organ console have been ordered. However as is the case with almost all material and equipment deliveries today, there are delays. Lewis & Hitchcock anticipate that most needed material and equipment should be arriving in August.

If these deliveries arrive in August, the following is a projected project schedule:

August 29th Console cabinet rebuild to be completed September 15th Refinishing of Console cabinet to be completed October 15th Console completed with installation of Syndyne MS – 8400 Master Control System October 17th – 28th Installation of new Console in Cumberland
