SECOND READING

²⁶ Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷ So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, the queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸ and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹ Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰ So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹ He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³² Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

ACTS 8:26-40

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. ³³ In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴ The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵ Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶ As they were going along the road, they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?"^{1 38} He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. ³⁹ When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰ But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

We have "worship bags" in the back of the sanctuary that include materials for drawing and coloring, as well as Bible stories and Bible word-find games. Our "To Families with Young Children" pew card contains information about why young children should be encouraged to come to worship and how parents and others can engage them more fully in worship. **Nursery care is provided during worship for all children 4 years of age and younger!**

THE CUMBERLAND CHORAL SOCIETY'S SPRING CONCERT DATES and the Grand Opening Weekend of the new Wills Creek Museum, located directly across from the church, are Friday, April 26 and Sunday, April 28. The two organizations will be celebrating and combining events this spring with music, tours, and receptions.

"Requiem," meaning "rest" in Latin, is the theme of this spring's music. CCS will recognize the legacy of Cumberland's ancestors as well as humankind here and now on this glorious planet. "Requiem for the Living" by Dan Forrest and a portion of the John Rutter "Requiem" will be presented by the Cumberland Choral Society, and includes professional soloists and orchestra this afternoon at 4:00 PM. A reception open to all will follow the Sunday concert. "Requiem for the Living" by Dan Forrest: Dan Forrest calls his composition Requiem for the Living because he is making a distinction from traditional requiems, which originated as masses for the dead. The word, requiem, is Latin for "rest."

What makes Requiem for the Living different? Why give attention to this particular work? It isn't that the work itself has shattered the norms of the genre; rather, Forrest puts a delicate twist into his work that raises the question: for whom is this intended? What sets his work apart is neither the text nor the music, but rather his intention-to ask for rest and mercy for the living. (Did you notice that Dan Forrest's last name is "For Rest"? Perhaps he was born to pen this requiem.)

In the words of the composer, Dan Forrest:

The five movements of Dan Forrest's Requiem for the Living, (2013), however, form a narrative just as much for the living, and

their own struggle with pain and sorrow, as for the dead. The opening movement sets the traditional Introit and Kyrie textspleas for rest and mercy- using ever-increasing elaborations on a simple three-note descending motive. The second movement, instead of the traditional Dies Irae, sets Scriptural texts that speak of the turmoil and sorrow which face humanity, while yet invoking musical and textual allusions to the Dies Irae. This movement juxtaposes aggressive rhythmic gestures with long, floating melodic lines, including quotes of the Kyrie from the first movement. The Agnus Dei is performed next (a departure from the usual liturgical order) as a plea for deliverance and peace; the Sanctus, following it, becomes a response to this redemption. The Sanctus offers three different glimpses of the "heavens and earth, full of Thy glory", all of which develop the same musical motive: an ethereal opening section inspired by images of space from the Hubble Space Telescope, a stirring middle section inspired by images of our own planet as viewed from the International Space Station, and a closing section which brings the listener down to Earth, where cities teem with the energy of humanity. The Lux Aeterna which then closes the work portrays light, peace, and rest- for both the deceased and the living.
